BASIC REQUIREMENTS NEEDED TO CARRY OUT LAPIDARY WORK (CABS)

- Waterproof apron
- 3 power head loupe, cost approx. \$30.00
- 10 power hand loupe
- Dop stick
- Slabbed stone of your choice

BASIC REQUIREMENTS NEEDED TO CARRY OUT FOSSICKING

- Good maps of the area you intend to visit
- 1 x Aluminium sieve 305mm diameter by 3mm, mesh 1/8 inch
- 1 x Aluminium sieve 305mm diameter by 7mm, mesh ¼ inch
- 1 x Small sturdy shovel (not the fold up type)
- 1 x Plastic gold pan
- Footwear Preferably boots to support ankles
- Headwear Wide brimmed hat
- Transport A 4x4 is nice, but a lot of areas can be accessed by conventional vehicles
- Accommodation Hotels, motels, caravans or camping. This can lead to very enjoyable family bush weekends
- Communication With the outside world is not necessary, but very handy to have. A mobile phone is useful in case of emergency and we strongly suggest a handheld UHF CB. These cost around \$50-\$100

The above are only the basic requirements to enable you to carry out this hobby. Extra equipment can be obtained at a later date if required. Enjoy yourselves; leave fossicking areas clean for others and some material behind for others – good luck and good fossicking!

Australian Facetors Guild Seminar.

NBLC was well represented at the recent seminar in Glen Innes, although those attending can attest to the coolness of the weather! My opening presentation was on the recent Northern Territory field trip, in which 40 NBLC members participated. On Sunday morning, we covered the National Library of Australia website – *Trove*. Our New Web Stats

As part of our web development we have embedded StatCounter which provides a whole range of analytical info on who is using our web site, what pages are visited, what key words were used, what type of computer the visitor was using and much more.

In the 2 weeks that the web site has been active I can tell you that we have averaged around 30 first time visitors to our website each day.

Within the 2 weeks, as further indication that the world is becoming increasingly mobile, just over 19% of visitors viewed our website on a mobile device. Of the mobile users Apple Ipad or Iphone accounted for 805 of visits while Samsung devices were used in 11% of visits.

What is your birthstone?

"October's child is born for woe, And life's vicissitudes must know, But lay an opal on her breast, And hope will lull those woes to rest."


Vicissitude: the quality or state of being changeable

The name opal is derived from the Sanskrit word "upala," as well as the Latin "opalus," meaning "precious stone."

The opal is a fragile hydrated silica material. It is a soft stone, easily altered in appearance by changes in heat and pressure. The varying amounts of water within it determine the appearance of the gemstone: when water evaporates out of an opal, the stone appears slightly smaller and the stress of the evaporation creates cracks on it.

Colours vary depending on impurities present within the stone: a pearly appearance is due to inclusions of tiny gas bubbles. Yellows and reds indicate the presence of iron oxides. The spectacular black opals that sometimes flash green, blue and red get their colour from

magnesium oxides and organic carbon within the stone.



The most valuable opal pattern is possibly the "harlequin" which has large angular patches of red, yellow and green, resembling the checks on a clown's costume.


According to Indian legend, the origin of the opal lies in a feud between the gods Brahma, Vishnu and Shiva who once vied in jealous love for a beautiful woman. This angered the Eternal, who changed the fair mortal into a creature made of mist. Each of the three gods then endowed her with his own colour so as to be able to recognise

her. Brahma gave her the glorious blue of the heavens, Vishnu enriched her with the splendour of gold, and Shiva lent her his flaming red. Alas, all this was in vain, since the lovely phantom was whisked away by the winds. Finally, the Eternal took pity on her and transformed her into a stone, the opal that sparkles in all the colours of the rainbow.

To ancient Romans, the opal was a symbol of love and hope. Orientals called it the "anchor of hope." Arabs say it fell from the heavens in flashes of lightning. It was believed to make its wearer invisible, hence the opal was the talisman of thieves and spies.

During the Medieval period, a change in colour intensity of an opal was believed to indicated if its wearer was ill or in good health. The opal was supposed to maintain a strong heart, prevent fainting, protect against infection, and cleanse foul-smelling air. The stone, as in ancient times, was still regarded as a symbol of hope.

I suspect, due to the change in believe that opal was a 'cursed' or 'bad' stone, the world added the Tourmaline as alternate birthstone to the month of October.

Gem-quality forms of this mineral have in the past been mistaken for rubies, emeralds and sapphires - a famous tourmaline - the size of a pigeon's - egg-belonging to the Russian Empress Catherine the Great was long thought to be a ruby.

Tourmaline has an unusual property: When warmed or rubbed it attracts small bits of lint, ash and paper because the gem becomes charged with static electricity.

Compared with other gemstones, tourmalines are a relatively recent discovery. Hence, it lacks the rich lore that accompanies many other precious gems. However, among some people, the stone is known as the "peace stone," believed to dispel fear and make its wearer calm.
