## BASIC REQUIREMENTS NEEDED TO CARRY OUT LAPIDARY WORK (CABS)

- Waterproof apron
- 3 power head loupe, cost approx. \$30.00
- 10 power hand loupe
- Dop stick
- Slabbed stone of your choice

## BASIC REQUIREMENTS NEEDED TO CARRY OUT FOSSICKING

- Good maps of the area you intend to visit
- 1 x Aluminium sieve 305mm diameter by 3mm, mesh 1/8 inch
- 1 x Aluminium sieve 305mm diameter by 7mm, mesh ¼ inch
- 1 x Small sturdy shovel (not the fold up type)
- 1 x Plastic gold pan
- Footwear – Preferably boots to support ankles
- Headwear – Wide brimmed hat
- Transport – A 4x4 is nice, but a lot of areas can be accessed by conventional vehicles
- Accommodation – Hotels, motels, caravans or camping. This can lead to very enjoyable family bush weekends
- Communication – With the outside world is not necessary, but very handy to have. A mobile phone is useful in case of emergency and we strongly suggest a handheld UHF CB. These cost around \$50-\$100

The above are only the basic requirements to enable you to carry out this hobby. Extra equipment can be obtained at a later date if required. Enjoy yourselves; leave fossicking areas clean for others and some material behind for others – good luck and good fossicking!

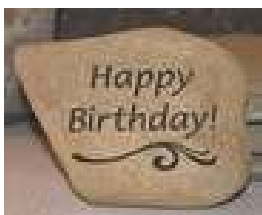

## **Gem Show News**

- ❖ Flyers have now been printed and delivered – stored in office.
  - ❖ 1,000 Rack cards offering “Free Admission” have been ordered and should be delivered next week.
  - ❖ 100 X 6mm gemstones (25 Amethyst, 25 Citrine, 25 Garnet, 25 Peridot) have been purchased for \$283. Jim Jeavons has tested the stones and all are natural although the citrine were heat treated and the garnets were almandine and not rhodolite as ordered. These stones will be individually bagged with a card containing information about the club on one side and information about the stone on the other.
  - ❖ Raffle prizes have not yet been completed and this is approaching a critical date if we are to have the tickets printed before December.
  - ❖ Dealer booking forms and information sheets will be distributed; commencing next week.
  - ❖ Gem show info and flyers will be mailed to all clubs in south east Queensland over the next few weeks.

## **AGM 2016**

The meeting noted that the Annual General meeting date decided at the last AGM will coincide with the Club's major field trip (to Tasmania) in 2016.

Garry asked that if any other members are interested in these courses, or other relevant courses, they let the Management Committee know so that a decision can be made on whether or not to reimburse the costs.

## ***Time of General Meetings***

K.W. asked what the response to the survey about the timing of General Meetings had been. This survey was conducted last year and there was practically no response. There was some agreement that day time meetings might attract more members. Garry Gatfield indicated that other organisations he is involved with have a presentation in order to attract members to general meetings.

It was agreed that this matter would be further considered by the Management Committee.

It was previously in a meeting discussed and considering that a number of our members are still in the work force an am meeting would only be possible during the weekend. Based on the poor result and outcome it was decided to leave the time as is for now].

## ***Snippets***

Some short snippets of decisions made at the September general meeting which was attended by the regular few; a disappointing representation of the almost 300 members of the club.

- ❖ A portable defibrillator is to be purchased at a cost of just over \$2,000. The machine will generally be kept in the club but will be taken on field trips for use in emergencies.
- ❖ The old sanding units that were to be sold at the opening day last Saturday were forgotten in the excitement. These units will now be put into the auction to be conducted at the Xmas breakup.
- ❖ Management committee has confirmed that all fees – joining fees, membership fees and work session fees will remain the same for 2016. This means these fees have remained the same since 2012. For members requiring a newsletter to be posted the postal charges are being increased to \$10 per year in line with postal cost increases.

## **2015 AFG Faceting Competition Results**

Members of the NBLC performed with distinction in this competition, the results were announced at the recent AFG Faceting Muster at Glen Innes. Barry Kirkham was the Intermediate Runner-Up champion, Vicki Thomsen won the Novice Championship, followed by Rosss Beattie, who was the Runner-Up.

Additionally, Barry scored 1 x 1<sup>st</sup> place gold medal, 2 x 2<sup>nd</sup> place silver medals and 2 x bronze 3<sup>rd</sup> place medals, his highest score was an excellent 98.91, followed by a 98.75.

Vicki won 2 x 1<sup>st</sup> place gold medals, 1 x 2<sup>nd</sup> place silver, and 1 x 3<sup>rd</sup> place bronze medals. Vicki's highest score was 98.25.

Ross scored 3 x 3<sup>rd</sup> place bronze medals and his highest personal score was 92.75.

### **Silver Threads - Book Review** (By an Amazon customer)

A new book dealing with making wire filigree jewellery has been added to the library.

The author of Silver Threads, Jeanne Rhodes-Moen, lived in Norway for 14 years. During her time there, she learned traditional Norwegian filigree techniques and developed her own style.

Patterns similar to filigree have been spotted in Viking jewelry as early as AD 800. Danish goldsmiths brought them back to Norway in the late 17th and early 18th centuries.

If you have always wanted to make your own jewelry or want to make and sell filigree jewelry, this book has all the information you need to get started. The first few pages take you through a wide variety of jewelry from many countries. The hinged purse necklace in the shape of a heart is fascinating as are the butterflies that look like stained glass.

Plique-à-jour is a variation on piercing where the pierced filigree is filled with transparent enamels. This technique produces the look of fine stained glass on a very small scale.
